## **Home Economics off to a great start**

Home Economics is being taught this year as an elective subject to year levels 7 through to 10. Home Economics is an interdisciplinary study drawing on the fields of nutrition, textiles and fashion, the built environment, human development, relationships and behaviour. The central focus is the wellbeing of people within their personal, family, community and work roles. Home Economics encourages personal independence and effective living within wider society, and promotes preferred futures for self and others.

This term has kicked off with cooking and food technology and we will cover textiles and fashion technology next term. So far the students have learnt about nutrition, how to read a food label, how to cater to individuals with differing dietary requirements and how to reflect on food through using their senses and a more mature approach. They have also learnt some practical skills such as knife skills, concentrating on the French cuts. They have also learnt relevant cooking skills such as practising food safety, making dough, icing skills, measuring out ingredients and following a recipe. Some items we have made so far have been homemade pizzas, fruit kebabs, fresh mild salsa, and Mini Pavlovas.

There is a Queensland Culinary Competition for Year 10 students that we will be participating in later in the year. Great prizes are up for grabs and I hope our students can prosper and represent the Australian International Islamic College well. They will have my full support and additional training will be given to them by me to get them ready for the competition. My plan is to develop a positive reputation for our school through our students as leaders in culinary excellence.
